Digging ditches across the airstrip

Our friends, Tyler and Renae Schmidt, serve with Missionary Aviation Fellowship (MAF) in Indonesia. Tyler went through Moody Aviation years ago. Their son Caleb recently went on a two-week ministry trip with his international school. The purpose of the trip was to serve the community and missionaries living in Turumo, a swampy, lowland village in the interior. Here, two Western missionaries have started the process of learning the language and forming a written language to translate the Bible.

In this area, the airstrip would get ruts up to two feet deep because of the swampy terrain. The teens dug 16 trenches across the airstrip and lay "French drains." They hauled rock, put tubing down, and covered it again. Each trench took about 40 manhours! This essentially gave the missionaries 640 hours to focus on translating the books of Galatians, Ephesians, and Philippians...instead of doing manual labor on the airstrip themselves! The teens also led the village kids with a kid's club. It was rewarding for the teens to teach the indigenous kids the first pieces of Scripture that had been translated into their language. The kids memorized those verses and took them home to share with their families. The teens even heard the village kids humming the songs they had been taught. The Light of the Gospel is beginning to shine in this dark

What was the biggest difference between the lives of these people and yours?

Caleb Schmidt's answer:

The difference between the Turu people and HIS (Hillcrest International School) was phenomenal. The Turu people are still unreached and continue to act in their tribal ways. I talked to the missionary who lives there, and he said they have often threatened to destroy his house or kill his kids, and they are not empty threats. The Turu people are very suspicious of one another and need the gospel of Christ in their lives. There is a church, but it is a sad, empty building and not a real body of Christ. I hope the gospel will change their lives soon.

### **WHAT'S HAPPENING AT HOME?**

He loves working hard on his 'struction site.' **Annabelle** likes to sing, wants to help me with various tasks!, and loves playing with her brothers. She's also got quite an imagination. She recently told me, "Do you want to come backpacking with me?" What a thrill to my heart! **Andrew** is crawling and pulling himself up, trying hard to keep up with his two older siblings! He sure can tell a good story with his babbles! It was wonderful to have **Dad and Mom Reimer** with us for a week while Josh was in TX for the work conference!

**Thad's EOE** (eosinophilic esophagitis) continues to be the thing that is testing our faith and pressing us hard into the Lord. The restricted diet he was on for several months (no wheat/gluten, eggs, dairy, potatoes, nuts, sea food, soy, sesame, and a few other allergens) did not put his EOE into remission. It actually got worse by the February biopsy numbers. EOE causes esophageal damage, constricting and stricturing it over time if EOE does not go into remission. This causes eating/swallowing to be difficult and painful for Thad. We are trying a new medicine for about 3-4 months to see if we can get the inflammation to decrease. It is a daily journey. The Lord is walking with us, giving us perseverance for one meal at a time! Thad has been an incredible champ through the process! God is growing faith in all of us!
